
The Creativity Intent:

What Creativity looks like on the:	
EYFS Pathway	Our Early Years learners will explore and play through interaction and observation and will express themselves through a breadth of mediums across art, design technology, music, drama and dance; as well as Expressive Arts and Design elements of the EYFS framework.
Pre-Formal Pathway	Learners use play and exploration to experience a breadth of mediums across art, design technology, music, drama and dance. Making choices and developing their confidence and self-expression.
Semi-Formal Pathway	Semi-formal learners recognise and differentiate between the different creative areas and begin to use subject specific language. Learners use techniques and skills with more meaningful outcomes and intent to create; building on their confidence and enjoyment of the arts.
Formal Pathway	Formal learners use subject specific language, exploring and practicing skills and techniques as they take inspiration from artists across art, design technology, music, drama and dance. As they progress, they learn to extend their knowledge, refine techniques and develop critical thinking skills in order to take a reflective view on how far they can progress their work and the value the arts have in society.
Post 16 Pathway	Skills, knowledge and experiences across the areas of creativity link to accreditation and elements of both careers and enterprise as well as independent and supported living skills. These skills, knowledge and experiences are applied across real life situations and help prepare for meaningful roles in their community and potential place of work.
